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we are so blessed to have Seth Gruber with us this morning. I know he's a very busy guy, so we so appreciate his time. And I'm going to just jump in with the scripture of the day, and we're going to pray, and then I'm going to introduce Seth. So here we go. My scripture this morning is John 10 10. It's a short one. The thief does not come except to steal, to kill, and to destroy.

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I have come that they may have life and that they may have it more abundantly. Again, John 10 10. Doesn't that kind of sum up the agenda of this God of this world, right? There's this package deal to steal, kill, and destroy, and we see that everywhere in our fallen world. So we're going to pray this morning and jump right in. Let's pray with me today. Lord, we find ourselves in a world today that rejects truth and justice and righteousness. And Lord, it makes us weary and vexed in our souls. And yet we know that you have a plan for your people to light up the dark as much as it is within our influence. Lord, we thank you that despite the futility that seems all around us, we do long all the more for the kingdom to come.

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We ask that you comfort those who are weary in well-doing, weary of the agenda of the wicked, and we know that you are working your perfect will out, not just for your people, but the nations as well. So thank you that you are a mighty God and powerful to save. I want to lift up Seth and his loved ones today, and we thank you for his passion, for upholding life and liberty, and his love for those who cannot defend themselves. Protect him, guide him, give him wisdom in all things. In Jesus' name, Amen. Like I said today, my guest is Seth Gruber. He's a public speaker focused on

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equipping Christians and pro-life advocates. He's the son of a Pregnancy Resource Center director. He was raised in the pro-life movement and he's been speaking publicly on behalf of unborn children since the age of 19. He travels and speaks in Christian schools and churches, pro-life training seminars, pregnancy resource center, and he also engages in academic debate. No surprise there. During his college years, he founded and directed the Students

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for Life Club at Westmont College, a Christian liberal arts school. And now he's a nationally renowned speaker for life, founder and president of the White Rose Resistance and host of

the popular podcast Unaborted. SethGruber.com, thewhiterose.life. Good morning, Seth, and welcome back to Stand Up for the Truth.

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Thank you, guys. Good morning.

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It's great to have you. Tell us a little bit about the White Rose Resistance. For those who are unfamiliar with what that stands for, maybe they haven't heard you before, tell us a little bit about that.

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Yeah, we're now the fastest growing pro-life organization in America. We launched right after the overturning of Roe versus Wade and the White Rose Resistance is actually the story of a bunch of kids in their 20s in Nazi Germany in Munich during the Third Reich in 1942 and 1943 who were writing, distributing illegal leaflets that were condemning the crimes of the Nazis and asking good people to wake up. They said things like, if you know, why do you not act? They said things like, do not hide your cowardice behind the cloak of expediency. They said, we are Christian and we are German. Therefore, we are responsible for Germany. And they were trying to wake up the church and people who knew better to act and to engage in Christian resistance.

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To make a long story short, they were arrested for their activities and they had their heads chopped off for trying to wake up the church in Germany to stand against evil, to stand for the rights of their neighbors, to stand for freedom. And we find ourselves in a very similar situation and position today in America. You know, people are criticized when they make too many comparisons to Nazism, eugenics, by the way, this belief that there are good genes and bad genes and we need to create a master race. And so, you know, we need to re-educate the bad Republicans and we need to throw any January

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6th people who put two toes into the Capitol for five seconds and throw them in a federal prison and not give them a lawyer. Things are so out of control right now that it's impossible to not begin to draw a comparison. And once you know the history of kind of how the current culture of death in America got created, it's impossible to not make comparisons to the same kinds of evils and ideologies that our brothers and sisters in Christ were facing during the Third Reich. And that's why we launched this ministry, was to fulfill the goals of the White Rose Resistance, to

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to prick the conscience of the culture and awaken the church to action before

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it's too late. Well I think by the time we're done today people will understand more and more how there is nothing new under the sun and it is a very very similar environment that

we are in today. And before we jump in on that I want to ask you a little bit about your schedule. What are you doing these days? Are you mostly speaking in churches or, you know, banquets? What are you finding now is the pattern for what you're doing these days?

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Yeah, I mean, we've been on a nonstop church tour since the fall of 2022, so less than two years. I've spoken at a slew of university campuses. We did a university tour called Adolph Who? The Bloodbath of Margaret Sanger. That rustled some feathers, obviously. I keynote galas and pregnancy centers around the country. I do as many as I can because I came from that world, but I'm kind of busy growing this ministry. And then we're developing resistance circles all around the country. So we're hiring quickly, we're staffing up, and we're actually going to be developing chapters around the country led by godly men and women. We are a Christian ministry. We make no apologies for that, because you know why?

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This was the role of the church, and we're trying to put ourselves out of a job by teaching the church how to be salty again. Ending abortion is actually not the role or duty of the pro-life movement. It's actually the duty of the church. The history of our faith in Christendom is that wherever the gospel was preached,

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social transformation followed. That it wasn't merely or exclusively about the proclamation of salvation, obviously that's important, but it's actually living the gospel. It was Christians who were launching all the orphanages, who were raising orphans as their own, who were rescuing infants abandoned to die from exposure to the elements in Rome, when the Persians were developing surgical curette procedures, when ancient Hindus and Arabs were concocting chemical pessaries that were pushed or shoved into the womb through the birth canal, when the Egyptians were disposing

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of their unwanted girls by disemboweling and dismembering them and harvesting their collagen for the manufacture of cosmetic cream, it wasn't 501c3 standing against those evils. It was Christian. Pro-life expression is actually Christianity 101. Now, I'm part of the pro-life movement. I'm grateful for the pro-life movement, of course, but they're actually doing the job that the church is called to do. And so we're trying to put ourselves out of a job by awakening the church in America again, kind of follow me as I follow Christ, like follow us into Christian resistance, you can do this. Get off the bench, get onto the field of battle, stop being a bench warmer, and experience the greatest adventure of all, which is being used to stand for God's purposes in this fallen world. And he will work miracles when his people are

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simply obedient. Praise the Lord. And I love how you said about the gospel, because even in our verse this morning, we talk about the thief, but then it gives the antidote right there. I

have come that they may have life. And more abundantly, the gospel is the antidote to the kill and destroy culture that we're living in. Seth, let me just set this up before we launch into a good contextual history lesson this morning. We've lamented for some time here on the podcast the absolute destruction of the porn revolution around the globe, the gender surrender movement, the trans agenda, shoved down our throats day in and day out. Now, I'm a baby boomer and we never wondered about our gender.

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We never considered keeping anything about that from our parents. We never worried about our mental health in any of this. So there are a lot of roots and shoots that we can discuss about how we got here, but we're going to look at some of the latest examples later on, the latest examples to destroy our generation, but I want to start with movements, for lack of a better term, that have done the most damage in the shortest amount of time and produced the most rotten fruit imaginable. And before we get to Planned Parenthood and what they're up to, I'd like to start by talking about Margaret Sanger. Now she was born in 1879 and her father was a fiery opinionated

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atheist and she embraced the beliefs of this anarchist at an early age. She was a socialist, a humanist, an atheist, a feminist. She was involved in the occult, psychics, astrologers, seances, etc. etc. So none of this should surprise us, Seth, but can you just tell us something about her life? It's extensive, it's quite a life, but could you jump in and tell us about Margaret Sanger?

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Yeah, I mean, she's probably had a more curated treatment by the liberal establishment in America than almost any other radical leftist Marxist revolutionary in the last 115 years. They did the same thing to Kinsey, by the way, that was why that's why they tapped Liam Neeson to play Kinsey in the movie on Kinsey to, to curate and edit and round out the more rough edges of who that man actually was. But they did the same thing to say here. I mean, she's been called the patron saint of feminism. She's been called the birth control queen, breaking through glass ceilings.

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You got to remember, guys, Martin Luther King, Jr. won the first Margaret Sanger Award. Barack Obama won the Margaret Sanger Award. Nancy Pelosi won the Margaret Sanger Award. Kamala Harris won the Margaret Sanger Award. Hillary Clinton won the Margaret Sanger Award. And all of these people were drooling over her in their acceptance of her award. And this woman, of course, is the founder of Planned Parenthood, originally called the American Birth Control League, renamed Planned Parenthood in 1942 to deflect criticism from her involvement in the eugenics movement in America

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because Hitler had at that point given the phrase eugenics a little bit of a negative connotation. And everyone knew that Margaret Sanger was not merely part of the eugenics

movement. She was the eugenics movement. She was one of the leaders of the eugenics movement in America. And so the American Birth Control League, that name was so wrapped up, one and the same, essentially, with the eugenics movement in the American Eugenics Society, that that's why she changed the name, y'all, to Planned Parenthood in 42.

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Anyways, I thought that would interest you. But this woman inspired, her and her ilk inspired much of the Nazi eugenic legislation that would be on the books in the Third Reich. And now there's no letters between Margaret Sanger and Adolf Hitler, you know, but it's almost that bad, actually. It's almost that bad. She was a Neo-Malthusian, okay? She was a Darwinist and you were talking about the damage of bad ideas. I mean, she believed that Christianity, Protestantism,

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Catholicism was a joke, but it was a great danger because it was keeping people from true freedom and equality. And she was directly mentored by Havelock Ellis. Havelock Ellis was sort of the Alfred Kinsey of England, if you will. He was a weirdo, kooky, sexual pervert who hosted orgies in his home, who forced his wife into lesbianism, who began a raging affair with Margaret Sanger when she escaped the New York police for breaking the Comstock laws in 1914, for breaking

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obscenity laws, and she begins a raging affair with Havelock Ellis. He writes about their experiences in bed in letters that he forces his wife to read and drives her insane and she loses her mind. In Sanger's book, *My Fight for Birth Control*, in 1934, I believe, she openly admits that Havelock Ellis was essentially the number one most influential individual in her life. Why is that interesting? Because Havelock Ellis was mentored by Francis Galton. Francis Galton coined a term. He coined a term, he invented a word. That word is eugenics.

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That word is eugenics, listeners. If you're thinking of Hitler, Mao Zedong, Mussolini, good job, Pol Pot, that's all eugenics, this belief that it means good in birth. So some people are good in birth and some people are bad in birth. You want more of the good people and less of the bad people.

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Wow. And Galton was, did you mention this, he was related to Charles Darwin. In fact, he began this work, I think, right after Charles Darwin passed away.

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Yes. And so Francis Galton was Charles Darwin's half cousin. He read *Origin of Species*, it changed his life, and he credits his cousin's book to the new trajectory of his life. He's credited as the modern father of the eugenics movement. So isn't it interesting? We go awfully quickly from the premise, man is a monkey and an animal, there's no sanctity of life, to you should weed out the unfit. And that apple literally didn't fall far from the tree. It's

literally within the same family. Galton then mentors Hadlock Ellis, the Kinsey of England, the sexual chaotic weirdo, who then mentors Margaret Sanger, the founder of the largest, best funded,

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and most profitable 501c3 in human history, the largest abortion provider in the world, the largest provider of the pornographic comprehensive sexuality education in American public schools, and now the second largest provider of cross-sex hormones and puberty blockers.

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And where did they get all of that money? Is this from grants or because I know they receive outrageous amounts of funding. Is it mostly grants or how do they get their money?

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Yeah, I mean she then went on to build a global revolution. She came back in 1916 from England and opened up the first illegal unlicensed birth control clinic in the Brownsville section of New York. She then launched the organization in 1921. She launched her magazine in 1917, the Birth Control Review. She began to publish the articles of card-carrying Nazis and eugenicists. It's shocking to read her magazine today, of course. And she knew how to wine and dine the Rockefellers, the Fords, the She had conservative, allegedly conservative, support her. She worked her way into the halls of power and was probably perhaps the most effective fundraiser of the 20th century. She was a raging alcoholic.

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She continued to cheat on her husband. She had multiple affairs, but she was very effective at the culture of death. And yes, of course, they get grants. Planned Parenthood today gets about \$600 million in taxpayer funds, about \$600 million in taxpayer funds every year. But just their individual donor base is pretty incredible, and this is why we have to remember

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that we're not just dealing with one among many issues. We're dealing with what I think should be called as Christians the sacraments of Satan, the sacrament of secular humanism and secular progressivism. And our pagan culture is so in love with this sacrament that allows them to have orgasms without responsibility that even your run-of-the-mill lower or middle-class liberal in America probably gives \$20 to \$30 a month to Planned Parenthood. Their donor base is one of the most incredible things

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I've ever seen. Obviously, it's blood money, it's disgusting, it's demonic, but Satan is looking for kings, influencers, states, civilizations. He wants a global revolution and Margaret Sanger probably is the most effective, less disrevolutionary in America in the last 115 years.

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Yeah, boy, absolutely. And I think of the obscenity laws because she was really pushing the limit of her day. She had an underground paper. It was very explicit. The courts called her literature filthy, violent, indecent. And so, you know, the obscenity laws of the time

prohibited mentioning birth control. The post office refused to deliver her newsletters and pamphlets. She was facing a 45-year jail sentence.

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So she left the country so she could hobnob with the mega liberals over there, you know, the free thinkers in Europe. You know, so she immersed herself in the teachings of those who ranted and raved about, you know, population control but the obscenity this fascinates me because movies weren't even rated till the late 60s and now you can turn on any television or any I don't know anything and it's just all TVMA it's all off the charts it's foul it's disgusting and and so boy when I think of obscenity laws this country actually had them

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and censorship well many of them are still on the books. They are okay yeah. Wow well that's just amazing to me that that the cable and the various streaming services can get away with what they do and the pornography industry too. This is all offshoots I'm guessing of Margaret Sanger and all of this this vile stuff that she pursued and forced on on our culture. The pornography industry, let's talk about that a little bit. I think it started in America. I don't know what the Hugh Hefner connection is there.

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Is there a connection with Hugh Hefner and all of these historical figures?

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Of course there is.

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So Planned Parenthood, as I said, is the largest provider of pornographic comprehensive sexuality education in America today. And they actually helped architect, let me say that again, Planned Parenthood helped architect what is today called comprehensive sexuality education. So, if you've ever seen, I don't know, any moms or dads speaking at school board meetings in the last two and a half years, Christian? Very angry moms and dads because of the filth in the sex ed curriculum and in the libraries? Yeah, what I'm saying is that Planned Parenthood as the medical director in

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1964 and she founded SEACIS, the Sexuality Information Education Council of the United States. SEACIS then became the number one group, number one group, at the helm of creating, writing, publishing, selling, and placing into schools the pornographic, obscene, comprehensive sexuality education. It was founded, let me say that again, it was founded by Planned Parenthood's medical director with seed money, provided by Hugh Hefner. Hugh Hefner met a man

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while he was an undergraduate college student and a virgin, Hugh Hefner did, and that man's name was Alfred Kinsey. Kinsey then revolutionizes Hefner, and Hefner would refer to himself as Kinsey's pamphleteer. Kinsey's pamphleteer. If you look at the citations, if you

do the due diligence to trace the science, the citations of where this comprehensive sexuality education comes from, you'll always find yourself back at the Kinsey Institute at Indiana University.

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It was formerly called the Institute for Sex Research. It was renamed the Kinsey Institute when Kinsey died, I believe. I'm getting my dates mixed up. I believe he died in 65 or 66. And so Kinsey is actually the father of the sexual revolution. If you Google the phrase, father of the sexual revolution, the first hundred pages of Google will be Alfred Kinsey. Sanger, of course, should probably be considered the mother of the sexual revolution. One of the first board members of CECA, when

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Planned Parenthood's medical director founded it in 64, one of the first board members of CECA was Wardell Pomeroy. Now, Wardell Pomeroy was Kinsey's homosexual lover, and he took over the Kinsey Institute when Kinsey died. He was part of the pro-incest movement, Wardell Pomeroy was. He did an interview with Time Magazine in 1980 called Attacking the Last Taboo. The last taboo, what's the last taboo? Incest, okay? And he told Time Magazine in 1980, listen to this quote,

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he said quote, incest between children and adults can sometimes be beneficial and it need not be a sign of mental illness. That was said by the director of the Kinsey Institute, Alfred Kinsey's one of his many homosexual lovers, and the founding board member of CECAS, which was founded by Planned Parenthood's medical director with seed money provided by Hugh Hefner,

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which becomes the first group to begin organizing, writing, and pioneering what is today bringing all the pissed off, righteously angry mama bears and papa bears, because of the actual porn in the sex-ed health weekend, in the sex-ed curriculum. Planned Parenthood architected all of that stuff. That's just a little bit of the history behind this obscene, sexually charged culture of death that only gets a kid,

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for sexualized children. That agenda is very clear now, which is why I encourage you guys all to go watch the new documentary I had the honor of being in. My friends Robbie and Landon Starbuck, one of the biggest power couples in, I think, the church and the conservative movement today, just came out with a movie that was premiered on X Twitter, blasted out by Elon Musk. It's called The War on Our Children. You can buy it on Rumble or you can subscribe on Robbie Starbuck's ex-Twitter account to watch it.

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It's two hours and 20 minutes.



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Wow, wow.

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And it blows the top off of the entire war on our children, and I have an entire segment in that documentary about the Kinsey stuff and how all this stuff was architected, but it's very important for us as Christians to understand how this all happened, because you can't defeat an enemy you don't understand, and you can't destroy an enemy you don't know exists. Most people in the church today don't even know that this is an enemy and how he operates.

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Wow. And are you finding when you speak in the churches that a lot of people are learning all of this for the first time?

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The number one response I've gotten from people in the foyer or lobby of a church since August of 2022 when we kicked off the White Rose Resistance live tour is, Seth, I've never heard any of that before. So we are fulfilling God's warning to his people in Hosea 4, 6, when he says, my people are being destroyed for lack of knowledge. My people are being destroyed, meaning actively, it's happening now, are being destroyed

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for lack of knowledge. We are being destroyed for lack of knowledge. We do not understand the ideology of the enemy, nor the people that the enemy of our souls has raised up

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to advance his ideology in the public. Amen. And I'm a big, big fan of context. As people know, who listen to this podcast, there's always more to every single story. We can't live on the sound bites and the news bites that we get on our social media and all that. We have to do our homework. We have just a couple of minutes, Seth, before there's a break. You're listening to Seth Gruber on Stand Up for the Truth today on Friday, February the 9th. I want to talk briefly, and we can come back to this, just about the racism because you talk about all these people who got the Margaret Sanger Award, and she met with wives of KKK leaders and she met with the KKK.

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And when Hillary was waxing eloquent about Margaret Sanger back in, I think it was 2020, it stopped real quick when people said, you know she was a racist, right? So Jeff, I just want to talk a little bit about the whole racist aspect. Where does

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that fit in with Planned Parenthood, eugenics? Before we go to a break, is there anything you want to say about that? Well, yeah. I mean, she launched the Negro Project in 1939 and the proposal to her Negro Project said, quote, the mass of with the result that the increase

among Negroes, even more than among whites, is from that portion of the population least intelligent and fit."

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That was the opening proposal to her Negro Project. She then hired Negro Project directors to propagandize birth control in majority black neighborhoods. One of her Negro Project directors said, quote, there is a great danger that we will fail because the Negroes think that this is a plan for their extermination, so let's appear to let the colored run it, end quote. These are the kinds of things that racists say.

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She was not a racist in the way that we think of racism today. She wasn't concerned purely with melanin, she was concerned with genes. And so she was a eugenicist and because of that her racism came out as well. But what we're really dealing with is eugenics.

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Okay, okay. And I know that I looked up the definition as sort of a standard definition of eugenics, the belief that human character is entirely or in the majority caused by genes unaffected by education or living conditions. And that's just sort of a scary definition already but the number of abortions on minorities Seth it's the greatest among minorities is that

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is that my understanding is that true? Yeah that's true but it's shockingly and more tragically true with black America so black America accounts for about 12 to 12.5 percent of the American public so let's put that in half for women. So you got about six-ish percent of the American public that are black women, but

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are all of them of childbearing age. All right, well we are talking to Seth Gruber today. A very interesting discussion about the roots and the shoots of this death culture we find ourselves in. You're listening to Stand Up For The Truth. My name is Mary Danielson. Welcome back to Stand Up For The Truth for February the ninth. We're speaking with Seth Gruber today, Sethgruber.com, The White Rose Resistance, which can be found at thewhiterose.life. Seth you mentioned a movie about it's called the War on our Children it's on Rumble and then what's the name of the gentleman he also has a page that you can find it on.

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Yeah Robbie Starbuck and his wife Landon Starbuck are the producers of the film. If you subscribe to Robbie Starbuck's Twitter account you can get access to

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the full film or you can purchase it on Rumble. Okay and that is it is done and it's out and so people can watch that now. That's right. Okay sounds good. Wow, interesting interesting history. Like I said earlier there's nothing new under the sun. I want to mention a gentleman named Edwin Black and I know you're familiar with him. He wrote IBM and the Holocaust which I'm very familiar with which is simply technologically enabled genocide. That's the account of that and then he also wrote, War Against the Weak, Eugenics and America's Campaign to Create a Master

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Race. And what is so interesting, things that I didn't know here, is that there was a huge eugenics movement in the 20s, actually before that, in this country. California was considered the epicenter of the American eugenics movement during the first decades of the 20th century. There were eugenicists, race scientists.

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Stanford president David Starr Jordan originated the notion of race and blood in his 1902 racial epistle, Blood of a Nation. Then the Carnegie Institution got involved. They had index cards on ordinary Americans. They wanted to remove families. They were targeting Jew, Italian, and other immigrants. Seth, this is sort of an eye-opening thing for me. I had not read his book. What more can you tell us about how America was actually, where some of these scientists

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were in touch with members of the Third Reich? What's the story here? Yeah, see, the history behind how we got here, which is what I think most people are asking

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in our day and age right now in America, right? They're like, what is going on? What the heck is happening to America? How did this happen? The history, the answer to that question is far darker than most Americans are ready to handle. And I think there wouldn't have been a market for those answers that I'm very prepared to give before the pandemic of 2020.

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You're probably right about that.

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I'm sure people had a sort of trust in institutions in America. And so I would have been kind of the Alex Jones kind of, you know, conspiracy theorist weirdo. If I said that, I don't know, let me see here. The founding board member of Planned Parenthood, Lothar Soder, was referred to as the spiritual father of Nazi Germany by Hans F. Gunther, a race anthropologist

in Germany, one of Hitler's henchmen, who was actually given a award on eugenics by Hitler himself, and one of the highest ranking members of the Nazi party, referred to the founding board member of Planned Parenthood as quote, one of the spiritual fathers of Nazi Germany. And he was so beloved, Lothar Stoddard was, that he was invited on a journalistic interview tour

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in the Third Reich in 1939, with him in full access to interview anyone he wanted in the Third Reich, because the Nazis knew that he was one of them. He's the only American we know of. He is the only American we know of to have had a one-on-one, a one-on-one meeting with Adolf Hitler after he rose to power. Yes, that's the founding board member of Planned Parenthood, Lothar Ripp-Soddard.

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Lothar Ripp-Soddard was a high official of the Massachusetts KKK, of the Massachusetts Ku Klux Klan. He wrote a book called The Menace of the Underman. The Menace of the Underman. He was a raging eugenicist. Who's the Underman? Well, in his understanding, black, sloths, Italians, and Jews, and the mentally and physically unfit, disabled, handicapped. And that book, The Menace of the Underman, was read by Nazis, okay? And Adolf Hitler's chief racial theorist, Alfred Rosenberg, appropriated the German term Untermensch, the German term Untermensch,

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from the English version of Lothar Stauder's book. In other words, the menace of the underman, underman, translated by the Nazis to Untermensch, and the title of Heinrich Himmler's famous Nazi propaganda book, Untermensch. Yes, listener, you just heard me correctly. The Nazis got the term subhuman from the first board member of Planned Parenthood and his book,

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The Menace of the Underman. What I'm saying is, is I don't think people would have been prepared for those answers and they would have labeled me a conspiracy theorist if it was 2018. But post-2020, everyone's like, you know what, I bet that weirdo, Seth, I bet he's right.

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I wouldn't put it past these eugenicists, diddle-the-kids sickos, to have actually pulled off that kind of history. So your question was eugenics, California, how did all this insanity happen? Yeah, I mean, we had a Supreme Court decision in America called Buck versus Bell in 1927 that upheld Virginia's 1924 mandated sterilization

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of those considered a threat to the gene pool. Of those considered a threat to the gene pool. Did you guys know that within about 10 or 15 years of Buck versus Bell, over 70,000 people were forcibly sterilized between California and New York. Guess who celebrated Buck versus Bell when it was decided in 1927?

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Margaret Sanger. Of course. Guess what the Nazis did at the Nuremberg trials, they cited Buck v. Bell in their defense. They said, who are you to judge us? You had Buck v. Bell. You forcibly sterilized people that you defined as unfit to reproduce, unfit to continue bearing children or living. Guys, the Nazis cited our eugenics laws in America in their defense at the Nuremberg trials, for goodness sake. And yes, California was a leader in the eugenics movement. California was responsible for nearly half

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of those coercive sterilizations, okay? And one of the most influential eugenicists in the American eugenics movement in the late 20s and early 30s was named C.M. Goetz, okay? And in 1934, he helped arrange for Nazi scientific exhibits to be shown at the Los Angeles County Museum. That same year in 1934, as German sterilizations were passing over 5,000 a month, C.M. Goetz returned from Germany and said to an associate of his, he said, quote, you will be interested to know that your work has played a powerful part in shaping the opinions of the group of intellectuals who are behind Hitler in its epoch-making program. Everywhere, he said, I sensed, I sensed that their opinions have been tremendously stimulated by American thought.

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a great government of 60 million people. And so later, Adolf Hitler, Adolf Hitler, okay, actually gave credit to American eugenics laws for the kinds of laws he put on the books. Here's what he said. Hitler once bragged to a colleague, and he said, now that we know the laws of heredity, it is possible to a large extent to prevent unhealthy

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and severely handicapped beings from coming into existence. He said, I have studied with interest the laws of several American states concerning prevention of reproduction by people whose progeny would, in all probability, be of no value or be injurious to the racial stock." End quote. Hitler said that, y'all. Of course, he's using that euphemism, prevention of reproduction. What a euphemism. He says, I studied the laws in American states

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about eugenics. He says, it's possible, it's possible to prevent unhealthy and severely handicapped people from coming into the world. That is, again, just a little bit of the history behind the eugenics movement, so I'll finish with this statement. Guess who Margaret Sanger shared office spaces with?

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When she planted her organization, the American Birth Control League, later renamed Planned Parenthood in 1921, she shared office spaces with the American Eugenic Society. That's who she shared office spaces with. And all of the early funding and all of the early board members of Planned Parenthood were either part of the American Eugenic Society

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or were clearly part of the American eugenics movement. At the time, the American Eugenics Society was being led by Madison Grant. Madison Grant wrote a book called *The Passing of the Great Race* in 1916, that was later assigned as essential reading in German schools. Madison Grant once put a black man in a cage with a monkey at the New York City Bronx Zoo to quote, illustrate evolution, illustrate evolution, that black man Ota Benga later took his life and shot himself in the head.

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Madison Grant fundraised with Margaret Sanger. They wrote for each other. They spoke at each other's conferences. Madison Grant had a secretary named Leon Whitney. Leon Whitney once said, while we were pussyfooting around, the Germans were calling a spade a spade. In other words, Madison Grant's colleague, Leon Whitney of the American Eugenics

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Society said, said, we're screwing around. You know, we're playing too soft shoe with eugenics. The Germans are calling a spade a spade. They're implementing eugenics much better than we are complaining that he wasn't implementing eugenics as well in America, as the Germans were doing in the third Reich. So one day Leon Whitney, who works for Madison Grant, who shares office spaces with Sanger from the American Eugenic Society, Leon Whitney gets a letter in the mail

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from a German corporal recently out of prison and rising in the German political scene, thanking Leon Whitney for his recent book on eugenics. Leon Whitney then runs over to a committee meeting, this is all documented by the way, interrupts his boss, Madison Grant, and says, Madison, our writings are influencing the German. Madison Grant, once again, let me say this again, the president of the American Eugenics Society, who once put a black man in a cage with a monkey, whose book was a signed reading in German schools,

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Madison Grant smiles and chuckles and pulls out his own letter he had just received from the same German corporal recently out of prison and rising in the German political scene after his failed coup attempt in Munich, calling Madison Grant's book *The Passing of the Great Race*, he called it his Bible, end quote. The man who wrote those letters was named Adolf Hitler.

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Wow, it takes my breath away, Seth, when you connect these dots. I know that dot connecting is not a spiritual gift, but if it were, you would...

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Y'all okay? You guys need barf bags?

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Is everyone okay in the studio?

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It's just incredible. You mentioned the pandemic, and I really, really am a big fan of having people trace that back, because how we got there should not have been a surprise to anyone, truly and really. And we go back to Nuremberg, and another branch on this demonic, wicked tree is those who also got away with murder, literally, at Nuremberg, and that would be the IG Farben cartel, BASF, Bayer, Bayer who was pushing heroin as a cough medicine back in the 30s and which led to LSD which sponsored the 60s. I mean there's a lot of dots connecting to go on there but corporations, the chemical corporations, the chemists war,

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World War I, the Zyklon B gas, World War II with Bayer who created enough Zyklon B gas to kill every American in 1970 and so there's just...

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Do you want something that will rip your face off? Sure, go for it. So, the abortion pill in America is called RU-486. RU-486, that's the technical name of the abortion pill. It's now responsible for over half, let me say that again, it's now responsible for over half of the babies killed in America after the overturning of Roe vs. Wade and medication abortion becoming more popular. And because of the Biden administration, it can be shipped through the snail mail postal service now. Okay, well, are you for 86 is the

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abortion bill. It stands for Roussel Uclaf, R U Ouklof, the French pharmaceutical company that created the abortion pill. Emmett Hill, the value or something like that, that art from Roussel Uclaf. Roussel Uclaf has a majority shareholder. Their majority Hoechst AG was the co-founder of a German chemical company known as IG Farben. IG Farben was responsible for creating a cyanide gas known as Zyklon B, the gas used to poison Jews in Nazi death camps. So Hoechst AG simply shifted from creating poison to murder Jews

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to creating poison to murder babies in the same company. Wow. I had done some research back in May of 1994 the US announced they were going to be testing the French abortionist pill with the agreement that patent rights be donated to the Population Council. Now that was started by John Foster Dulles and John D. Rockefeller Ford Foundation, Rockefeller Fund. Population Council, I never hear

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about them. I presume they're still around causing trouble? Oh yeah, no, the Population Council, yeah, still in operation. You can actually read a really great report that our friends at Live Action put together on the Population Council's involvement with the Abortion Pill. Live Action, a great pro-life organization, they have a report called Abortion Pill Kills, Abortion Pill Kills at their website. And yeah, the Population Council has been wrapped up in, they're one of those other groups, kind of like the American Eugenics Society that we could do whole lectures on just their, how they've had their fingers into so much of this

stuff. But yes, no, the Population Council was behind bringing the abortion poll to America. In fact, I believe they bought the rights. So yeah.

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Yeah, it's funny because I don't recall ever hearing about them. They never make the media. Planned Parenthood, we've heard about them for many, many years, but the Population Council, I think the listener would do well probably to look into them. And then there was also all the talk during the pandemic about the Vax and all of that and population control. I mean, this has never been far from the American conscience. I don't think it's ever going to be. Seth, I don't think we're ever going to stop talking about wiping out those people. They're just the W.E.F.

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You know, they think that corn and peas have the same right as humans. So we are once again sliding into that abyss because the WEF is carrying that torch. So what are your thoughts on Klaus Schwab? Does he have some Nazi roots? I understand that his grandfather was a Nazi.

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I don't know.

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Tell us, Seth.

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I mean, you could not have come up with someone who looks more like they could, they're like could have played a Bond villain in a James Bond movie. Like, it's almost too funny to be true. Like Klaus Schwab should just be, he should literally be an actor as a Bond villain. But like his voice, his appearance, everything is so,

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if it wasn't so evil, it would be really, really funny. And yes, of course, I mean, the World Economic Forum, I mean, they believe they're master planters. You know, they believe that we're all really stupid idiots who don't know how to arrange our lives or how to preserve Mother Gaia and how to take care of the earth and ensure that our grandchildren will have earth to inherit. You know, they believe in the lie of the sun monster that's going to burn us all up. You know, there's actually an interesting kind of connection, once again, between Planned Parenthood, the baby killers,

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and the population theorists, right? The people who say that there's too many people on planet Earth, and if we don't significantly reduce the world population, we're all gonna die, right? What did AOC say, like, six, seven years ago? I think she said we have, like, eight years left, or seven years left. Right.



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But don't worry, that's just the science, right? Well, one of the most popular, you probably know his name, one of the most popular authors, thinkers in the overpopulation movement or the population reduction movement is Paul Ehrlich. All right, Paul Ehrlich wrote a book called *The Population Bomb* in 1968. By the way, a Stanford University professor, the population bomb. And he predicts in his book in 68 that if we don't significantly curb population,

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then by the late 80s or 90s, we would have worldwide starvation. Okay? So I was born in 91. By the time I was born, from the time he wrote his book in 68 and predicted international chaos, to the time I was born, the world population had doubled. We were the fattest generation in American history, and malnutrition was at an all-time low. So, follow the science, I guess. Follow the science. Guess what? Paul Ehrlich sat on the board of Planned international policy adjustments. People were talking up about kind of the damage

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that has come from the overpopulation. It's actually very evil. His book is responsible for a lot of actually China's one-child policy. Because this book started to cause kind of international frenzy and fear because it was given the allure of scientific credibility. And if we don't do something, we're going to have worldwide starvation.

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We're not going to have enough food to be distributed to everyone. And by the way, like, Paul Ehrlich was a Neo-Malthusian, and so was Sanger, which refers to Thomas Malthus, the first overpopulationist, who in his writings at the end of the 1700s, early 1800s, he says that food production can't keep up with population growth, with the inevitable result being massive starvation.

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Okay?

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Banger literally referred to herself as a Neo-Malthusian. She literally hosted conferences called Neo-Malthusian Birth Control Conferences. I know that sounds crazy. I'm not making that up. She called her conferences Neo-Malthusian Birth Control Conferences. She referred to herself as a Neo-Malthusian, right?

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And that he was the first, we need to depopulate the earth. His book led to Indira Gandhi, the Prime Minister of India, start linking access to food, water, and healthcare to your sterilization status. Yeah, like you don't get to have healthcare or get to like drink water. You don't get to participate in the economy unless you can show you've had your tubes tied

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or you've had a vasectomy. Like, unless you've been sterilized, you don't get to live. Why?

Because they had to do that incentive in order to make sure that they would have an earth that could continue to live. That like, his book did like international damage.

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And of course, he sat on the board of Planned Parenthood. Like, we could go on and on and on and on here. Planned Parenthood is not just part of the population reduction movement, they are the population reduction movement. And one of the best ways that they depopulate people, shocker, is by killing them, is by killing babies in the womb, which has been a primary tool

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of the population reduction movement for decades.

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Wow. I'm sure among our listeners there's more than one jaw on the floor this morning. So you can pick your jaw up and you can listen again if you missed any of this. I had a weird little story. We were watching Netflix the other night and there was a food documentary called You Are What You Eat. And the premise of it as we got into it was they took sets of twins, many, many sets of twins and they put one on a vegan diet and one on an omnivore diet and the whole idea of the show was to push veganism as the show went on and on. It was preaching and it was all this but they're experimenting

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on twins and I heard my husband under his breath across the room say, didn't the Nazis do that? You know and it was so bizarre and people don't have, if you don't have any context, you don't even think about that. We're old enough to think about that but it's just everywhere. This culture of death is absolutely everywhere. You had said, we have a few minutes left, Seth, and you had said that Planned Parenthood is the most profitable nonprofit 501c3 in history. That blew my mind.

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The largest, best funded, and most profitable 501c3 in human history. And that is not a new data fact. That's been true since the 70s or 80s. Okay. That's who we're dealing with. And so, of course, they have their tentacles, their fingers, into every new iteration of the culture of death. Planned Parenthood is not an abortion organization. They're a culture of death organization. Which is why they're not only the largest abortion provider in the world, they're the largest provider of the pornographic comprehensive sex ed in American public schools,

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and now the second largest provider of transgender drugs. So, if they can't get the kids in the womb, they'll chop them up outside the womb. Which always made me ask a very interesting question. What is it about secular progressivism that makes you want to chop up children? Because what's the final thing you do if you follow the religion of transgenderism to its final iteration? You chop off body parts. You chop up people. What do they do in the

womb? They chop up children in the womb. You think that's a coincidence? No, it's not. Planned Parenthood was the eugenics movement.

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The American Birth Control League, its first name, was the eugenics movement in America. Okay, but Sanger once said, quote, eugenics without birth control seems to us a house built upon the sand. It is at the mercy of the rising streams of the unfit, the unfit. So she's using a biblical metaphor, the house built on the rock, the house built on the sand.

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She said, I'm trying to build this house called eugenics, right? She says eugenics without birth control is a house built on the sand. For her, birth control was the tool to be used to usher in the eugenics revolution and the eugenics movement. That was the whole point. So, if Planned Parenthood defended Buck v. Bell, which allowed our country to forcibly sterilize over 70,000 Americans between California and New York, if she celebrated that decision, if she called herself a eugenicist, if she coined the term birth control as a way to accomplish eugenics always involves sterilizing people,

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then do you think it's a coincidence, Christian, that Planned Parenthood is the second largest provider of chemically castrating transgender drugs in America? No, no, it's not a coincidence. They're simply doing what they've always done.

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Wow, and so being pro-life is advocating for the womb and it's advocating for children of all ages. And this really answers a question for me, Seth, about the age appropriateness of Planned Parenthood's school curriculum. They don't care what age that child is. Now in our minds, our moral minds, we think, well, this isn't appropriate for a five-year-old. It's not even appropriate for a 12-year-old.

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The UN lowers the age of consent and all that kind of stuff. But that's why the age doesn't matter. It's a child and they want to destroy a generation. We are at the precipice of destroying an entire generation, Seth. We've got a minute left. What can we do? I mean we listen to this and we know that it's just the agenda, steal, kill, and destroy. That's the agenda of the enemy of all of us humans who are made in God's image. But is there something that we can do? How can we spread the message? Yeah, go to

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thewhiterose.life, thewhiterose.life and join the White Rose Resistance. You join at \$35 a month, you get our resistance box in the mail to join Christian Resistance and you get an invite to our digital platform with pro-life courses. A lot more coming out soon.
